Music Lesson Plan

Title of Lesson: Introduction to Vietnamese Folk Music

Subject: Vietnamese Folk Music, "Trong Com"

Age of Children: 3-5 Years Old

# **Objectives:**

To introduce children to a different country's folk music. They can listen to one of Vietnamese children's folk songs, called, "Trong Com" or "Rice Drum"

To demonstrate how to use the real Rice Drum and dance along with the music.

To identify a couple of Vietnamese words in the song and translate them into English.

#### **Materials:**

8 Rice Drums

"Ao Tu Than" or traditional dresses of peasant for girls and boys

Pictures of Vietnamese children playing this instrument on stage performance and pictures of children in their daily life activities on Poster Board English Vietnamese coloring and reading books

### **Procedure:**

#### **Transition:**

Gather children in a circle and explain they will be watching a short performance of Vietnamese children playing and dancing along with the Rice Drums.

#### **Motivation:**

Pass out Vietnamese traditional toys like paper kites, paper lanterns, To He (small figurine made from glutinous rice powder)

Play a game called "Meo Bat Chuot" or the Cat chasing the Mouse.

#### **Presentation:**

Watch a video

Introduce Rice Drums and demonstrate on how to use

Let the children explore them

Have children dress up
Put on music and have fun

# Language/Literacy:

Children will have the opportunity to read the following books:

"Song of the Mekong River" by Na-mi Choi "Tet: Vietnamese New Year" by Dianne M. MacMillan

"Going Home, Coming Home" by Truong Tran "Wishes" by Muon Van and Muon Thi Van

# **Extension/Follow Up Activities:**

All the centers in my daycare will reflect the theme.

- For Art, children will make Vietnamese flags by coloring white rectangle papers in red, then use star cookie cutters to stamp yellow on top of the red flags.
- For science, they color jasmine rice with vinegar into a variety of colors.
- For math, they then use the colored rice to measure into different bottles using cups measurement.
- In dramatic play, they have opportunities to wear traditional clothes and wooden shoes and triangle hats.
- In the kitchen, they will assemble Banh Mi, an extremely popular sandwich combining both Viet and French pate on a baguette and taste a variety of herbs like cilantros and pickled daiko with carrot.

#### **Evaluation:**

Do the children seem interested in this folk music? Do they dance along with the song?

Do they enjoy exploring and making sound out of the Rice Drums?

Do they try Banh Mi or enjoy making sandwiches? Are they excited playing dress-up?

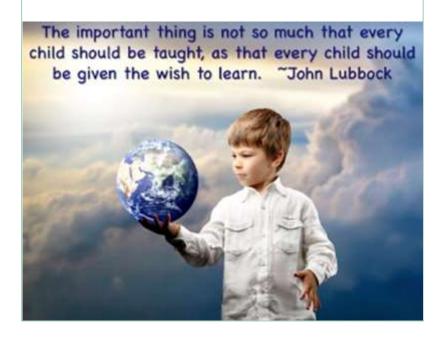

# Baked Ham and Egg Cups

Would like to make something easy and simple with the children for Mother's Day breakfast? Look no further with this easy and delicious recipe.

• Level: Easy

• Yield: 6 servings

Total: 35 minPrep: 15 minCook: 20 min

# Ingredients

12 thin slices Black Forest ham (about 10 ounces)

1/2 cup shredded Swiss cheese

6 large eggs

6 tablespoons heavy cream

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 tablespoon chopped fresh chives

Directions:

Special equipment:

Six 8-ounce ramekins or souffle cups

- 1. 1. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Line the ramekins with nonstick aluminum foil and place on a baking sheet.
- 2. 2. Stack 2 slices of ham directly on top of each other and fit into a ramekin to form a cup, making sure the ends of the ham hang over the ramekin slightly.

  Repeat with the remaining ham. Dividing evenly, sprinkle half of the cheese into the bottoms of the ham cups. Crack an egg into each and add 1 tablespoon cream. Divide the rest of the cheese, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper evenly among the cups.
- 3. 3. Bake until the egg whites are set, and the yolks are still soft, 20 to 24 minutes, rotating the baking sheet halfway; some cups may cook faster than others. Sprinkle with the chives and then carefully lift the ham cups out of the foil so you do not tear the ham or break the shape of the cup. Place on a large platter or on individual plates and serve.

#### JOIN THE FOOD PROGRAM AND GET PAID TO SERVE NUTRITIOUS FOOD!

What is the Child and Adult Care Food Program (aka CACFP)?

USDA CACFP is a federal program that reimburses family child care providers for serving nutritious

#### Why join the Food Program?

- . It's Free!
- All regulated FCC providers are eligible to join the CACFP.
- There are two main benefits:
  - o Nutritional Benefits You will receive the most up-to-date nutrition education based on USDA guidelines to help you plan and serve healthy meals and snacks to the children in your care
    - · Nutritious food contributes to the wellness and development of young children and teaches them healthy eating habits that last a lifetime!
  - o Financial Benefits Each month you will report, through KidKare (the free software we provide to our providers), the number of meals and snacks you serve. You will then receive a reimbursement to help you cover the costs of the food you served.
  - o Providers receive reimbursement based on Tiering:
    - Tier 1 Rate Higher rate of reimbursement if you live in a community that is economically in need and/or qualify by household income.

      • Tier 2 Rate – Lower rate – "All Other Providers"
  - o If you serve one breakfast, lunch and a snack per day the average rate of reimbursement "per child" is:

Tier I (higher) - \$1,205 per year (20/21 Rate)
Tier II (lower) - \$577 per year (20/21 Rate)

NOTE: USDA Announced in April 2021 that because of the COVID 19 Pandemic a waiver has been put in place that allows all providers to receive the higher Tier 1 Rate of Reimbursement from JULY 1, 2021, through JUNE 30, 2022.

#### Is it financially beneficial for me to be on the program? What about taxes?

- Joining the food program makes financial sense. You are always financially better off on the Food Program.
  - o Do you want to win the lottery?
  - o If your spouse got a raise, would you accept it?
  - o If your child care parents paid you more, do you want it?
  - o The answer is "yes" to all the above. In each of these scenarios you earn more money, pay more in taxes, and have MORE MONEY IN YOUR POCKET after paying taxes.
  - MORE INCOME IS ALWAYS BETTER!!!
  - o For every \$1000 you receive from the CACFP you can expect to keep about \$600-\$700 in your pocket after taxes.



#### Common Objections:

"It's too much paperwork" - Well we all know paperwork is no fun, BUT you are being paid to do the paperwork. The Planning Council pays for KidKare and offers it free to all providers. KidKare reduces your paperwork, and you can use your smartphone, iPad, laptop and/or computer to record your meals and attendance and use eForms to enroll your children, etc.

- If you spend 3 hours/week doing paperwork and care for 4 children, serve breakfast, lunch, and a snack
- Tier 1 \$1205 x 4 = 4820 ÷ by 156 hours = \$30.89 per hour
- Tier 2 \$577 x 4 = 2308 ÷ 156 hours = \$14.79 per hour

"I only qualify for Tier 2 Rate and the CACFP reimbursements don't cover the cost of my food."

- Some money is always better than no money.
- If you got \$1000 from the CACFP and your food costs were \$2500
  - o Why give up \$1000 in income?
  - o If you do not take the \$1000 income from the CACFP your food costs will not change.

"My enrollment is low; I'm Tier 2 and I only serve one (1) snack. It's not worth it to claim a 21-cent snack."

- Well, actually "NO" that is inaccurate
  - You will earn approximately \$10.06 per hour by claiming a 21-cent snack.
     1 child x \$.21x 5 days a week x 52 weeks = \$54.60 a year

  - o 4 children x \$.21 x 5 days a week x 52 = 218.40 a year o 5 minutes a day to enter it into KidKare = 21.7 hours a year

  - \$218.40 ÷ 21.7 hours = \$10.06 per hour for your CACFP hours.

"I will lose my food deductions if I join the CACFP so I will be worse off financially."

- Nope! This is a common misunderstanding.
- . You are entitled to claim food expenses in the same way whether you are on the CACFP or not.
- You can deduct the meals/snacks you get reimbursed for by the CACFP.

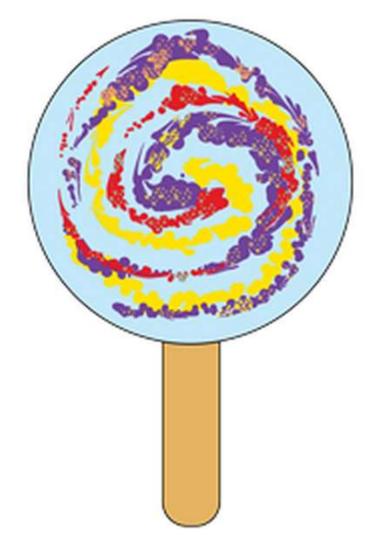
JOIN Now! There really aren't any serious objections to joining the CACFP. It's a wonderful nutrition program that will help keep the children in your care healthy and it's a significant financial benefit that will put cash in your pocket.

# Luscious Lollipop

Description

This lollipop looks good enough to eat!

Materials for one lollipop:

- light-colored construction paper
- small plastic lazy Susan
- tempera paints in squeeze bottles
- glitter (optional)
- jumbo craft stick
- tape
- scissors

Setup: Cut a circle from the paper to match the size of the lazy Susan. Lightly tape the cutout to the center of the lazy

Susan.

## Steps:

- Squeeze a small amount of paint on the paper as your teacher slowly spins the lazy Susan. Repeat this process for other colors of paint.
- 2. Sprinkle glitter over the wet paint if desired. Set the painting aside to dry. (Tape the craft stick to the back of the painting.

Greetings,

On March 29, 2022, non-criminal justice agencies were given notice from the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) Information Technology and Communications Division (ITCD) that the Maryland Criminal Justice Information System (CIIS) Central Repository would begin the process of ensuring that non-governmental entities only receive state Criminal History Record Information (CHRI) while the Maryland Office of Child Care (OCC) receive related federal CHRI for employment and/or licensing purposes to adhere to current federal law and regulation. Be advised that 'Child Care: Region 6' will be ready for this rollout in two weeks from the date of this letter.

On April 25, 2022, the CJIS Central Repository will modify authorization numbers to allow for the proper dissemination of federal CHRI, pursuant to Public Law 92-544. As of that effective date your region should begin the exclusive use of the following Authorization Number and Originating Agency Identifier (Z-ORI) for background check purposes. (PLEASE NOTE: The utilization of any credentials other than those provided will result in delays in your process):
